Lesson Plan Objectives:

At the end of this lesson, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze a character from the book Wonder.
- 2. Provide textual evidence for their character analysis.
- 3. Create a Voki avatar that demonstrates their analysis and animates their favorite character.

Classroom Teacher – School Librarian(s) Collaboration:

- Classroom teacher explains character analysis.
- School librarian provides character analysis frame.
- Educators work with students on character analysis frame.
- Educators facilitate students' creation of Voki avatars.
- School librarian uploads character Voki to library page.
- Both educators evaluate students' final products with a rubric.

Measurable Outcome or Final Product: After analyzing a character from *Wonder*, students create a Voki avatar that represents their chosen character and clearly represents their character's traits.

Estimated Lesson Time: 2 days

Instructional Plan Outline:

Preparation:

- Discuss the different characters in the book *Wonder*.
- Review the process of analyzing a character.
- Review the importance of and provide examples of textual evidence in character analysis.
- School librarian and classroom teacher work on character analysis frame with students using a character they have previously studied.

Motivation:

- 1. School librarian and classroom teacher introduce the Voki site to students.
- 2. Educators work together to create some sample Voki avatars based on other characters the students have studied previously.
- 3. Share sample Voki and assess it using the rubric: http://tinyurl.com/wonder-sample-voki

Presentation:

- 4. Educators review the process of character analysis using the Character Analysis Worksheet.
- 5. Educators lead students through the steps needed to create a Voki. (Official Voki tutorial: http://tinyurl.com/tutorial-voki)
- 6. Students select a character to analyze and provide textual evidence from the book using the Character Analysis Worksheet.
- 7. The student must have the character describe him- or herself and provide textual evidence to support their analysis.

Guided Practice:

Day One

- 8. Educators monitor as students complete Character Analysis Worksheets and draft a script to add voice to their Voki avatar.
- 9. Educators read the drafts and discuss revisions with students.

Day Two

10. Educators monitor students and provide feedback as needed as they create their Voki avatars.

Closure:

- 11. School librarian links students' finished Voki avatars to the library page.
- 12. Students present their Voki to classmates in the library.

Assessment:

13. Educators evaluate students' Character Analysis Worksheets and Voki avatars with the Voki Rubric.

Extension:

- 14. Students can use <u>www.tagxedo.com to</u> create a word cloud with words that represent the character they chose. They will use their character analysis worksheet to help with this.
- 15. Students can interview the character as a journalist and ask questions that help to analyze and understand the character.
